News and Musings

There is nothing constant but change. And, we have certainly experienced some major changes, lately. Within a two week period we lost Carl Brown, a long-time and very beloved member of our congregation, and learned that our minister will soon be moving on to another position. We now also know that the Saugus congregation will be exploring other options rather than worshiping with us next church year. In the larger world, gasoline hit the milestone of \$4.00 gallon this month. Sometimes I wish change were a little less constant and life a bit less eventful.

But, changes and events in our lives, such as the death of a beloved friend or family member, help us grow as we cherish and learn from the memories while working through the grieving process.

There are other events, such as the resignation of a minister that, while sad in some ways, can help us grow by inspiring us to see ourselves in new and positive ways.

As the President of our Board of Management (BOM), I want to let everyone know that the BOM, with some guidance from our Mass Bay District Executive Terasa Cooley, is exploring options and may need to schedule an all-congregation meeting toward the end of June to determine when we will begin a search for a new part-time minister and whether we search for a “called” or “consulting” minister.. Whether any vote is needed or not, we may, as a congregation, decide to schedule a meeting just for informational and discussion purposes. I personally think that we should bring back the “talking stick” circle format. (If you joined us later than March 2001, ask a longer-term member about our first all-church talking stick discussion, which was about the Pink Pistols.)

In the meantime, we all need to do some soul-searching and come up with accurate descriptions of who we are as a congregation, what our mission in the larger community is, and where we see ourselves, or WANT to see ourselves heading during the next few years. We need to do this for ourselves, but it will also be very helpful as a basis of any ministerial search process.

A questionnaire will go out to members and active friends of the congregation in a week or so via email or, to those without email, postal mail. This communication will also explain the difference between a called and a consulting minister. In the meantime, please feel free to share your thoughts and ideas for the future with me or any Board member so that we can gather the input and make sure that everyone is heard.

As long as we truly listen to each other and have faith in ourselves and each other, we will be able to work what may seem like miracles.

Onward we go!

The Guidelines of Goodbye

By now most of you received my letter and are aware that I will be leaving Wakefield for another position and this will be my last column. I will be available to you by appointment through June during this time of change and transition, if you wish to talk. The month of July, I will be on study leave and in August on vacation.

Some of you have commented that "Oh, we can still keep in touch." After August 31, I will no longer be your minister and cannot function in any ministerial role or confer with you regarding the state of the church. Certainly that is not the case should we bump into one another while shopping or on the street, where we can greet one another and speak of anything but church. These regulations were set in place by our UU Ministerial Guidelines in order for the congregation to adjust and to move forward with your new leadership. This also allows for the new minister to establish his or her ministry without any interference from former ministers. All too often this regulation is not made clear to the congregation and they feel shunned or ignored when told they cannot initiate communication with their former minister. The Guidelines are very clear on this and it is important that you all understand why this regulation is in place.

As we both move on into the future, I send my very best wishes and hopes for your future.

A Farwell from Rev. Jackie Clement

A friend was recently relating what he had learned while doing research for an RE class he was to teach. What particularly caught his notice was the contrast between the linear sense of time in Western culture and the cyclical nature of time in Native American and other primal religions. What astounds me is how the cycles seem to be ever accelerating! Once again I find myself standing incredulous at the end of a church year that it all could have flown by so fast.

It's been a very full year, one with new and interesting challenges, one with old and not so interesting challenges, one with some pretty unique solutions. What we have done here this year, as two congregations together, seems to break new ground, and that only serves to amplify all the blessings. The first and greatest is the blessing of generosity. A congregation willing to open its doors to others without condition or demand is an incredibly generous one. We talk often about radical hospitality, but here it has been practiced.

Another of the blessings shared this year has been gratitude. It has been indeed a blessing to receive, but it is also a blessing to acknowledge the gratitude we feel for the gift of hospitality. On behalf of the Saugus congregation I want to thank everyone in Wakefield who genuinely reached out a hand of invitation and welcome.

From this year and from blessings shared, a new strength has been felt in the Saugus congregation. I have seen a spirit grow built on having faced tough challenges as a congregation and having come together in their wake to know that they have done well and been good stewards. Now as we come to the end of church year we face more change, but with a renewed sense of who we are and what we can accomplish, a sense of the generosity of the world, and our own capacity for thankfulness.

I hope we will continue to remember new

friends made and some of the great experiences of this year together. For me, the highlights came in times of sharing through the Evensong sessions, in all everyone contributed to the Bible class, in trips to Brother's, in the fine music the choir offered, and in Alla's incredible talent and warmth. I'll remember trying to come up with a sermon title a week in advance for Eric to put on the sign and the fabulous Solstice service. Memorial Day Weekend Plant Sale Thank You To All!

The books aren't quite closed yet, but it looks like we will end up netting a little over \$1,100. for the plant sale this year. It's a lot of fun and a lot of work, and I suppose it is probably worth it, but right now my back aches and I have a seemingly permanent layer of dirt ground into my hands. I want to thank the crew for the wonderful team effort, with lots of willing volunteers like Peter Stickel accompanying me to the Flower Market,

Kelli Parece helping me dig up hostas at Marcia Calvin's house, and Matt Jewett digging up Chris Fontein's lilacs. Kay Lewis and Nancy Trimper both made signs. Kay's went in the wayside pulpit, Nancy's was on the information board. Sheila Moran sent my press release to all the local papers, and Janine Fabiano put it on Craig's list.

The morning of the sale, Jenna Rankin-Doucette made the coffee while Matthew Lowry, Janine Fabiano, Janet Schuchter, Kelli and Avery Parece, Matthew Jewett, and Theo Noell unloaded the truck, set up tables, arranged and rearranged plants on the tables. Lucy Skeldon, who was sick with a cold but came to help anyway, cleaned up the pots and spiffed up the plants. Nancy Trimper and Ruth from Reading, whose last name I do not know, identified and ticketed the remaining donated plants that I had not yet priced. With that energetic staff, we were ready to go at eight o'clock.

Janine Fabiano and Kelli Parece were in charge of the cash box, and were ably assisted by Avery Parece, who also helped me in several ways throughout the day. She took on the project of presenting all children who came to our sale a handful of seeds, told them what they were and how to grow them, and encouraged people to buy raffle tickets for the beautiful blue and yellow quilt that Janey Joos had made and brought with her to the sale. It was nicely displayed on a rack in front of the linden tree. Everybody else sold, helped people get plants to their cars, or rearranged plants and tables over and over again as things were sold and spaces opened up on the tables. Starbuck Hersey, with her adorable cockapoo, and Wendy Dennis were also on hand to do whatever needed to be done.

The public didn't come en masse like they did two years ago, or even in the droves of last year. In fact, there was very little foot traffic, but most people who came did buy a few plants. We ended the day with about \$1,400 in sales, or \$840 in profit. With my plea to the congregation during Sunday's service, we added some sales and brought it up to just over

It's been way too long since Meg Kilkelly has played flute for us. As the nursery-care person, she fills a hugely useful position for the RE Committee, which tends to lock up her time on Sunday mornings. Her efforts enable parents of very young children to attend the service in the sanctuary. It was therefore no mean feat to spring her for Children's Sunday (May 4) to give of her talents in the service as a musician. Meg soloed a piece from "Carmen" and also played soaring passages for "Colors of the Wind."

As has been the custom for many years, this joyous service offers our children an opportunity to gain experience playing instrumental music in front of an audience. Both Emma Lowry and Emma Kraus performed piano solos; Alejandro Winsor exhibited his prowess on guitar; Cole Kraus grounded the song from "Pocahontas" with a steady drum beat.

The Jr. Choir & Ensemble sang two songs: "The Rainbow Connection" and "Colors of the Wind"; Emma Kraus, in keeping with the theme of colors, wowed the congregation with "Over the Rainbow."

No less than nine pieces were performed by this group, consisting of Carolyn Hotchkiss, Eric Semple, Sara Weeks, and Charlie Weeks. Our congregation demonstrated their love of music by turning out in good number (42 adults and 3 children).

The third Sunday of the month (May 18) was led by Holly. The choir reminded the congregation (via

song) to 'gather ye rosebuds while ye may'. It was appropriate in view of the sad announcement of Carl's passing. We're all mortal, after all.

Marcia Calvin learned the second anthem ("Sing Together") at Jr. Choir & Ensemble practice, and sang with the adult choir. She also took the plunge and quickly learned the other piece because it used the famous poem by Seventeenth Century luminary Robert Herrick. She's partial to Herrick. It was great having her sing all the choral anthems.

Memorial Day Weekend was upon us (May 25) marking a great music morning. Guitarist Dennis Fardy led a combined adult/jr choir (there were nine singers) with the sixties song "Four Strong Winds." New England String Ensemble founders Peter Stickle and John Bumstead added quite a bit to the accompaniment of a choral anthem, and played with Alla for other service music. John even sang bass on "Now is the Month of Maying" by Thomas Morley (1557-1603).
